

Top 5 Recommended Reads for Christmas




Black Cake by Charmaine Wilkerson (2022)

Charmaine Wilkerson's debut novel is a story of how the inheritance of betrayals, secrets, memories, and even names can shape relationships and history. Deeply evocative and beautifully written, Black Cake is an extraordinary journey through the life of a family changed forever by the choices of its matriarch.



Shadow and Bone by Leigh Bardugo (2012)

Surrounded by enemies, the once-great nation of Ravka has been torn in two by the Shadow Fold, a swath of near impenetrable darkness crawling with monsters who feast on human flesh. Now its fate may rest on the shoulders of one lonely refugee. If you enjoy this then there is so much more by the same author: the Shadow and Bone trilogy, the Six of Crows duology, the King of Scars duology.




The Perks of Being a Wallflower by Stephen Chbosky (1999)

This is the story of what it's like to grow up in high school. More intimate than a diary, Charlie's letters are singular and unique, hilarious and devastating. Chbosky champions and celebrates inclusivity and tolerance by showing both how people can blossom when they are accepted for who they are and how painful life can be for people who are ignored or mistreated.



All the Broken Places by John Boyne (2022)

Recommended for Year 10 and above. A devastating, beautiful story about a woman who must confront the sins of her own terrible past, and a present in which it is never too late for bravery. Sequel to *The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas*, the narrative voice is the older Gretel.



Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens (2018)

Atmospheric and tumultuous, Owens' writing is dreamy. She creates a sublime narrative which tells the story of an isolated girl surviving on the fringes of society in North Carolina during the 1950s and 1960s. Against the backdrop of racial and social strife, the narrative follows Kya, viciously pegged the "Marsh girl" by the narrow minds of townsfolk. Disclaimer: the film of this novel is not worthy
