# Monday 27<sup>th</sup>– Friday 31<sup>st</sup> March 2023

Last weekend the Year 12 geography students visited Swanage in Dorset to carry out fieldwork for our A level coursework, with Mr Orr, Miss Archer, and Mrs Kemp. Although the weather was a bit wet and windy, the trip was a success overall- with only a few cases of people getting wet feet! We managed to collect a range of data,

from transects of sand dunes in Studland Bay, to interviews of residents in Poundbury, to measurements of beach groynes in Swanage, which will all be useful for our coursework we are completing in



the next few months. After finishing our fieldwork, we were also able to visit some of Dorset's famous coastal landmarks, including Durdle Door, Lulworth Cove and Chesil beach and spend some time with students from other schools also on their field trips. We had a great few days of work, fun and sore feet!

On Friday 17<sup>th</sup> March, a group of Year 10 students had the spectacular opportunity to attend the annual Maths Feast that takes place at Thomas Tallis School in London. Right from entering, they were welcomed with brain-teasers. They were put through various obstacles where their maths skills were tested vigorously. They went through 4 rounds,

each harder than the previous and a relay at the end. Despite this, our students won the Maths competition, out of 20 teams, becoming the first winners for Mayfield Grammar School since attending these competitions. On Tuesday the Music department hosted the Spring Concert. Fifty performers from all years of the school entertained the audience and the standard of music presented was very high indeed. Performances from the Voice in a Million Choir, The M&Ms, Stay Tuned and Boomwhackers represented the extra-curricular life of the department and there were some very high-quality solo performances. Year 10 had an exciting opportunity to go to a purpose-built Buddhist Temple, which are very rare in Britain. This one was built by the Thai Royal family to serve the Thai community in Britain, and it has a permanent monastic presence. The Buddhapadipa Temple was built at the end of the 1970's but was not completed until 1985. Students learnt about the history of the building in Wimbledon. The original house is now the monastery, and the Temple was built in the Thai style.

Inside the walls and ceilings are covered with murals which tell the story of the Buddha. However, the monks, who were brought over from Thailand especially to paint the walls had fun and painted some very modern objects and people into the pictures. In the image of Buddha's enlightenment, where he is facing both good and evil, are some famous faces including Ronald Reagan and Mikhail Gorbachev. In another image you can find Margaret Thatcher. Students were given the opportunity to speak to the abbot and learn about life as a monk. He spoke very openly about the rules and life style he had chosen to adopt and the students were shocked to learn that he spent between 6 and 8 hours meditating each day. Students were given time to wander around the ground and see the



smaller shrines and sit watching the water in the artificial lake/river, along with the meditation exercises the trip was a very relaxing time, and certainly it destressed us all, if only for a day.
